

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Letter from the Director...

In 2005, we conducted the first ever *Statewide Survey of Victimization in New Mexico*. What we learned is that 1 in 3 adult women and 1 in 7 adult men have been the victim of domestic violence in their lifetime. Similarly, 1 in 4 adult women and 1 in 10 adult men have been the victim of intimate partner violence in their lifetime. The surprise finding of the survey was the number of adult women (1 in 4) and men (1 in 14) in New Mexico who have been stalked in their lifetime.

Although the survey identified 36,594 adult domestic violence victims last year, the average number of incidents experienced was 5.5 per victim, an estimated 201,267 incidents of domestic violence in 2005. Similarly, 17,177 stalking victims experienced an average of 14.3 incidents each, an estimated 245,631 stalking incidents in 2005.

Just under half of those who were ever victims of domestic violence, intimate partner violence and stalking were injured in their victimizations and slightly over one-third of them sought medical treatment. This is our first glance at how much healthcare utilization is associated with interpersonal violence.

The aforementioned is just a small sample of the valuable information you will find in this year's report. We are confident you will find it informative and hope that it serves you in your professional capacity throughout the next year.

On behalf of myself and the Office of Injury Prevention, we thank all of you for your daily commitment to preventing interpersonal violence and the courage you demonstrate when responding to the many types of trauma experienced in our communities statewide.

# **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

# I. INTRODUCTION

Nationally, victimization surveys such as the National Crime Victims Survey and the National Violence Against Women Survey capture more comprehensive estimates of crimes, and in particular, interpersonal violence crimes than that which is captured by law enforcement. While New Mexico law enforcement agencies have reported their incidents of domestic violence, intimate partner violence, stalking and sexual assault to the Central Repository, determining the rates of these crimes that were *never* reported to law enforcement was not possible. The long term goal to rectify this problem and make possible more accurate estimates on the prevalence and incidence of interpersonal violence in New Mexico was to conduct our own statewide victimization survey. To this end, in 2005 the *Statewide Survey of Victimization in New Mexico* (SSV) was conducted, asking 2000 adult men and 2000 adult women about their experiences of violence. While all data captured from this survey will be analyzed over the course of time, several discouraging realities are clear from the preliminary findings of this survey:

- 1. The rates of domestic violence, intimate partner violence and stalking in New Mexico are staggering; and higher than national comparable rates found in the National Violence Against Women Survey (NVAWS), the most comprehensive victimization survey to date;
- 2. These interpersonal violence crimes are significantly under-reported to law enforcement;
- 3. There are significantly more victims of interpersonal violence than ever identified by law enforcement or service providers statewide, especially in the case of stalking;
- 4. There are significant co-morbidity and healthcare utilization associated with interpersonal violence; and
- 5. There are significant differences between males and females in the experience and adjudication of interpersonal violence crimes.

# II. FINDINGS

# A. Prevalence and Incidence of Interpersonal Violence

Fifteen percent or 1 in 7 adult males in New Mexico has been the victim of domestic violence in his lifetime, and 32% or 1 in 3 adult females. Unfortunately, there is no comparable national rate available, as only physical assault in general, is captured.

Ten percent or 1 in 10 adult males has been the victim of intimate partner violence in his lifetime compared to 7% nationally (NVAWS). One-quarter (25%) or 1 in 4 adult females has been the victim of intimate partner violence in her lifetime compared to 22% nationally (NVAWS).

Seven percent or 1 in 14 adult males has been the victim of stalking in his lifetime compared to 4% nationally (NVAWS). One-quarter (25%) or 1 in 4 females has been the victim of stalking in her lifetime compared to 12% nationally (NVAWS).

In 2005 in New Mexico, 28,256 cases of domestic violence were reported to law enforcement, and 18,778 victims identified, which is half (51%) of the victims identified (36,594) in the SSV in the same time period. Domestic violence victims reported an average of 5.5 victimizations each by their offender in the last year, resulting in an estimated 201,267 incidents of domestic violence in New Mexico in 2005.

In 2005, law enforcement identified 206 stalking victims. The SSV identified 17,177 stalking victims in the same time period (83 times as many). Stalking victims reported experiencing an average of 14.3 stalking incidents each in the last year, resulting in an estimated 245,631 incidents of stalking in New Mexico in 2005.

## **B.** Interpersonal Violence and Injury

Each year, law enforcement and service providers report the number of domestic violence victims that are injured as a result of their assault. In 2005, over one-quarter (28%) of law enforcement reported domestic violence incidents resulted in victim injury; and service providers reported that one-third (34%) of the adult victims they served were injured. Findings from the SSV reported that a significant proportion of those who were ever victims of domestic violence (44%), intimate partner violence (47%) and stalking (44%) were injured in their assaults. However, until now, we have never known how many victims of interpersonal violence sought medical care as a result of their injuries. In New Mexico, no standardized or centralized reporting process exists for capturing information on how many victims of interpersonal violence seek medical care.

### C. Interpersonal Violence and Healthcare Utilization

Findings from the SSV reveal that slightly over one-third of those in New Mexico who were ever victims of domestic violence (35%), intimate partner violence (37%) and stalking (38%) went for medical treatment as a result of their injuries.

What we do not know, is how much healthcare utilization occurs as a result of comorbidity among interpersonal violence victims. For instance, the SSV revealed that adults who were ever victims of domestic violence (16.5%), intimate partner violence (17%) and stalking (16%), experienced serious, disabling injury at twice the rate of the non-victimized population (8%). Additionally, adults who were ever victims of domestic violence (12%), intimate partner violence (11%) and stalking (12%) were nearly four times more likely to suffer from one or more chronic mental health conditions than non-violence victims (3%).

## D. Men as Victims and Offenders in Interpersonal Violence

It is widely reported nationally and locally that most victims of interpersonal violence are females and most offenders are males. What was not known, and is most interesting, is that most *male* victims of interpersonal violence are victimized by a *male*, as well. A significant proportion of males who were ever victims of stalking (51%), domestic violence (62%) and intimate partner violence (49%) were victimized by a male.

# E. Relationship Between Victims and Offenders of Interpersonal Violence

Two-thirds (66%) of victims of intimate partner violence were assaulted by an exromantic partner. Most (33%) stalking victims were stalked by someone they knew but not a relative or ever a romantic interest. Stalking victims were equally likely to be stalked by a stranger (28%) as an ex-romantic partner (27.5%).

# F. Interpersonal Violence Involving Sexual Assault

The proportion of New Mexico adults who were ever stalked and also sexually assaulted in their lifetimes (48%) was greater than those who were ever domestic violence victims and sexually assaulted (45%) and intimate partner violence victims and sexually assaulted (44%). However, in the course of one's lifetime, one could be stalked by one person and sexually assaulted by another. A better measure of the rate of sexual assault by the same individual who commits physical assault is obtained by examining intimate partner violence in the last 12 months. Among intimate partner violence victims last year, 11.5% reported being sexually assaulted by their intimate partner. More female intimate partner violence victims were sexually assaulted (13%) than male intimate partner violence victims (9%).

# G. Gender Differences in Interpersonal Violence

## 1. Interpersonal Violence and Weapons

In 2005, over one-third (38%) of domestic violence incidents reported by law enforcement involved a weapon. However, with aggregate reporting instead of individual records, it was not possible to determine if there was a difference in the rate of weapon use among the interpersonal violence crimes or if there was a difference in weapon use based on the gender of the victim. The SSV revealed that 32% of domestic violence, 33% intimate partner violence and 31% stalking incidents involved a weapon; and each of these crimes was significantly more likely to involve a weapon if the victim was male, than female: domestic violence (36% males, 30% female); intimate partner violence (41% male, 30% female); and stalking (39% male, 29% female).

## 2. Interpersonal Violence and Restraining Orders

Over the last four years, the Central Repository has reported that the average number of protection or restraining orders issued by the District Courts was equal to roughly one-quarter (26%) of the number of domestic violence incidents reported to law enforcement. The SSV revealed similar results, as roughly one-quarter of domestic violence (21%), intimate partner violence (23%) and stalking (26%) victims obtained a restraining order. However, results from the SSV showed that female domestic violence and intimate partner violence victims were 2.5 times more likely to obtain a restraining order than their male counterparts. Similarly, female stalking victims were almost two times more likely than males to obtain a restraining order.

As a result of the SSV, we have our first measure of how many restraining orders are violated by the offender. Over half of all restraining orders in interpersonal violence crimes were violated: domestic violence (53.5%); intimate partner violence (56%); and stalking (51%); and

restraining orders obtained by male intimate partner violence victims had the highest rate of violation (58%).

# **3.** Interpersonal Violence Reported to Law Enforcement and Rate of Arrests

Over the last three years, the Central Repository reported that an average of 54% of domestic violence victims who went for help reported their victimization incident to law enforcement. The SSV revealed significant differences in the rate of reporting to law enforcement by the victims of the three types of interpersonal violence crimes: domestic violence (38%), intimate partner violence (41%), and stalking (34%). While one-third of stalking victims reported their victimization to law enforcement, there were fewer arrests for stalking (5.5%), than for domestic violence and intimate partner violence (17%, respectively). Moreover, in cases of domestic violence and intimate partner violence, more offender arrests were made when there was a female victim. With stalking crimes, the arrest rate was almost equal for crimes perpetrated against female (6%) and male victims (5%).

### 4. Interpersonal Violence and Criminal Charges

Domestic violence and intimate partner violence victims were more likely to file criminal charges (1 in 7, respectively) than stalking victims (1 in 17). Again, domestic violence and intimate partner violence female victims were two times more likely to file charges than male victims. Conversely, female and male victims of stalking were equally likely to file criminal charges.

## H. Dispositions in Interpersonal Violence Crimes

Stalking offenders had the fewest outcomes with charges dropped (13%) compared to offenders of domestic violence (25%) and intimate partner violence (28%) offenders. Additionally, stalking offenders had the highest rate of guilty pleas or convictions (51%) over domestic violence offenders (38%) and intimate partner violence offenders (39%). Offenders of each interpersonal violence crime involving a female victim were significantly more likely to plead guilty than offenders of each with a male victim. The rate of acquittals for offenders of male domestic violence and intimate partner violence were 4 and 5 times, respectively, the rate of offender acquittals for these crimes with a female victim. Conversely, offenders of stalking with a male victim were much less likely to obtain an acquittal (<1%) than stalking offenders with a female victim (5%).

Roughly two-thirds of all those sentenced for interpersonal violence crimes were sentenced to jail or prison. The average sentence length for convicted domestic violence offenders (3.04 years) was longer than that of intimate partner violence offenders (2.7 years) and stalking offenders (1.97 years). Domestic violence and intimate partner violence offenders received a longer average sentence when the victim was a female, while stalking offenders received a slightly longer average sentence when the victim was a male. Offenders sentenced for stalking a male victim actually served a longer average sentence (2.0 years) than offenders sentenced for intimate partner violence with a male victim (1.5 years).

# **III. IMPLICATIONS OF THE FINDINGS**

# A. Underreporting of Interpersonal Violence and Law Enforcement Procedural Training

 $\geq$ In 2005, law enforcement identified 18,778 victims from 28,256 reported incidents of domestic violence. The SSV identified almost twice as many victims (36,594) and each experienced an average of 5.5 incidents last year. Similarly, in 2005 law enforcement identified 206 stalking incidents. The SSV identified 17,177 victims and each experienced an average of 14.3 incidents last year. There are numerous administrative and procedural issues that affect accurate reporting of domestic violence and stalking incidents ranging from whether and how police offense incident reports are written, how these reports are entered into law enforcement databases or otherwise counted, what aggregate information is submitted to the Central Repository and how information is entered into the Central Repository. The issues surrounding identification of stalking incidents and victims are particularly worrisome. The SSV demonstrated that while onethird of stalking victims reported their experience to law enforcement, there were significantly fewer arrests for stalking (5.5%) than for domestic and intimate partner violence (17% respectively). It is imperative to provide necessary training to all law enforcement officers, administrative personnel, and executive personnel whose policies guide law enforcement procedure regarding the description, documentation and data entry of interpersonal violence crimes.

# B. Underreporting of Interpersonal Violence: Law Enforcement Interpersonal Violence Training, Victim Education and Advocacy, and Healthcare Surveillance

- Incidents of domestic violence go unreported to law enforcement due to refusal of family, friends, or neighbors to report. Furthermore, as many as 49% (3,697) of the adult victims who sought services from domestic violence service providers claimed they did not report their incident to law enforcement. This is similar to the 50% of adult victims who report their crime to law enforcement nationally. Nationally, most victims (15.4%) who do not report said they considered the victimization a *private or personal matter*. However, only slightly fewer victims (13.2%) did not report because they were *afraid of retaliation* by the offender, *believed that the police would do nothing* (7.3%), or *did not consider the incident was important enough* to report it to police (4.4%). These findings have implications for the need of prevention and treatment strategies that include law enforcement training on the dynamics of domestic violence, and victim training on adopting a safety plan and legal advocacy.
- Patients that are seen in the healthcare/emergency room setting with a domestic violenceand stalking-related injury are typically not reported to law enforcement and represent an additional area of underreporting. While many healthcare facilities use screening tools to identify patients who are victims of domestic violence, no standardized monitoring system to reliably document the number of these individuals currently exists. Methods to determine healthcare utilization by victims of interpersonal violence through e-codes or billing databases have been unsuccessful and are unreliable at best, due to definitional problems of the codes, practitioner discretion and inconsistencies in naming injuries, and

the insurance related intentions of billing databases. The need to rectify these problems is underscored by findings from the SSV which revealed substantial co-morbidity with interpersonal violence victims with regard to serous disabling injury and chronic mental health problems. Additionally, one-third to one-half of interpersonal violence victims were injured and over one-third of them sought medical treatment. Increased accuracy in reporting interpersonal violence incidents and identifying victims for referral to needed interventions requires interpersonal violence surveillance initiatives in New Mexico healthcare facilities.

# C. Interpersonal Violence Prevention Aimed At Adolescents

Of the 15,050 law enforcement incidents documenting the victim/offender relationship, 66% were perpetrated by a current or former intimate partner, 45% of these by current or former boyfriends/girlfriends who are or were dating or living together. Ninety-one percent of adult victims who sought services from a domestic violence service provider were assaulted by a current or former intimate partner, 33.5% of these were dating or living together. The SSV found that two-thirds (66.5%) of domestic violence incidents were perpetrated by current or former intimate partners, one-third of these were dating or living together. Similarly, stalking behaviors begin in adolescents and the incidence of adolescent stalking is almost twice that of adolescent intimate partner violence. The high proportion of interpersonal violence cases perpetrated by those not yet married, demonstrate that true prevention requires early education initiatives on building healthy relationships during adolescence.

# **D.** Alcohol and Drug Education and Treatment in the Prevention of Domestic Violence

Alcohol and/or other drug use was documented in 29% of law enforcement incidents, 93% of these involved *suspect* use of alcohol/drugs, 18% involved *victim* use of alcohol/drugs. Additionally, 27% of adult victims served by domestic violence service providers reported being under the influence of alcohol/drugs at the time of their incident. Findings from the SSV revealed that alcohol/drug use is significantly more likely among male victims and offenders than female victims and offenders. Implications for treatment for both victims and offenders include alcohol and drug prevention education and rehabilitation services with particular focus on males.

# E. Stopping The Cycle of Domestic Violence: Helping Children from Violent Families

On average in New Mexico, 1 in every 5 incidents of domestic violence reported by law enforcement involved a child witness and an average of two children were present at each. Of greater frequency, at least one child was present in 1 out of every 1.6 adult victim cases handled by domestic violence service providers. Too many children experienced physical abuse (26%) and sexual abuse (5%) at the hands of their adultvictim's offender. To be sure, the rates of physical and sexual abuse among these children and their national counterparts is grossly underreported. Even so, the information regarding children victim-witnesses is particularly disturbing since research demonstrates that a significant number of children who witness their mothers being abused by their fathers suffer from anxiety and depression and act out with their parents and siblings. Additionally, children who witness abuse suffer poor health, low self-esteem, poor impulse control, sleeping difficulties, and feelings of powerlessness. Furthermore, they are at high risk for alcohol and drug use, sexual acting out, running away from home, isolation, loneliness, fear, and suicide.

Perhaps the percent of *adult victims* (55%) and *offenders* (67%) in New Mexico who were *abused as children* is a testament to the validity of such research regarding the negative consequences of experiencing abuse in the home as a child. Since 74% of the children present at the scene of the incident (as reported by domestic violence service providers) were under the age of 13, there is a need for early identification, education, and therapeutic interventions for children living in violent families.

# F. Interpersonal Violence Advocacy and Prevention

Findings from the SSV demonstrated that 1 in 7 adult males in New Mexico has been the victim of domestic violence in his lifetime, 1 in 10 a victim of intimate partner violence and 1 in 14 a victim of stalking. More outreach must be done to identify male victims of interpersonal violence to offer prevention and treatment programs specific to males.

# G. Providing Offender Treatment Programs

- ➢ In New Mexico, 77% of suspects identified by law enforcement and 90% of offenders identified by domestic violence service providers are *male*. Findings from the SSV revealed that 83% of stalking offenders and 80% of domestic violence and intimate partner violence offenders are male. Even when males are the victims in interpersonal violence crimes, half to two-thirds are being victimized by a male. Perhaps greater outcomes in domestic violence prevention may be realized through greater availability of offender prevention and therapeutic programs that include strategies for addressing aggression in male socialization.
- Findings from the SSV reveal that almost half of the adults in New Mexico who were ever a victim of domestic violence, intimate partner violence or stalking were also sexually assaulted. This suggests that effective prevention and treatment programs for interpersonal violence must include components of sexual assault prevention and treatment or must provide referrals to appropriate sexual assault services.

# H. Interpersonal Violence and Needed Changes in Law Enforcement, Prosecution and The Courts To Reduce The Risk of Harm for Male and Female Victims

Findings from the SSV demonstrate that female victims are more likely than male victims to report their offense, two times more likely to file criminal charges against their offenders and are more likely to get a restraining order against their offenders, even though interpersonal crimes with male victims involve more alcohol/drugs, weapon use and more serious disabling injury. Additionally, while half of all restraining orders are violated, male victims of intimate partner violence crimes are more likely to have a

restraining order violated, less likely to have their offenders arrested, significantly more likely that the charges against their offenders will be dropped or the offenders will obtain an acquittal. Further, if their offenders are convicted, offenders of male victims are more likely to serve less time in jail or prison than offenders of female victims. While all of the system failures that contribute to the high risk of harm for female victims of interpersonal violence were widely known, it is clear from these findings that interpersonal violence is dangerous for males, as well. While both genders do not utilize system protections as they should, male victims are even less likely than female victims to do so; and even when system protections are sought for intimate partner violence, violations of restraining orders are more frequent and convictions of their offenders less frequent for male victims. All of this speaks to: 1) the need for early education to correct misconceptions in gender socialization; 2) greater community education to increase awareness of the incidence and risk of interpersonal violence among males; 3) comprehensive training of law enforcement, prosecutors and judges regarding the high risk of harm for men and women victims of interpersonal violence and the development of protocol in their respective disciplines aimed at reducing the likelihood of harm, disability and death of all interpersonal violence victims.

# I. INTRODUCTION

This report has four sections. Section One presents findings from the first ever Statewide Survey of Victimization in New Mexico which offers statewide rates of the incidence and prevalence of domestic violence, intimate partner violence and stalking, together with a discussion of the findings on selected characteristics of these interpersonal violence crimes. Section Two presents an analysis of domestic violence data from the New Mexico Interpersonal Violence Data Central Repository. Section Three presents a discussion of the implications of the findings presented and a review of the data limitations to highlight future data needs. Section Four presents an analysis of 13 important domestic violence variables for each individual county, so that the reader can assess important domestic violence trends in his/her county at a glance.

The Central Repository is supported by the State of New Mexico Department of Health, Office of Injury Prevention and Behavioral Health Services Division and the New Mexico Crime Victims Reparation Commission Violence Against Women STOP Grant Program. It was established in 1998 to house data submitted from a variety of agencies statewide (law enforcement, district and magistrate courts, and domestic violence service providers) that deal with the issue of domestic violence. In 2001, the Central Repository began capturing statewide sexual assault data, as well. To this end, data from rape crisis centers, statewide mental health centers and sexual assault nurse examiner units (SANEs) that provide services for sexual assault victims are also submitted to the Central Repository.

## SECTION ONE: Statewide Survey of Victimization in New Mexico

### I. Background

In 2005, the Department of Health, Office of Injury Prevention obtained funds to conduct a statewide violence victimization survey (see **Appendix A**: *Statewide Survey of Victimization in New Mexico*). The survey was conducted by Schulman, Ronca and Bucuvalas, Inc. (SRBI) a national research organization with over 25 years experience conducting national and statewide surveys on health and trauma issues.

The purpose of the survey was to obtain state estimates of the prevalence and nature of victimization among adults in New Mexico. The sample for the Survey of Victimization was drawn from a statewide sample of telephone households developed by random digit dialing (RDD). A statewide random sample of 4,000 adults aged 18 and older: 2000 males and 2000 females, were interviewed. Interviewing for the survey was conducted between December 6, 2005 and January, 22 2006. Comprehensive information regarding the survey methods used (sample construction, instrument design, programming, testing, interviewer selection, training, monitoring, conducting the interviews, response rates, field outcomes, data preparation and processing) is found in the *Survey Methods Re*port available upon request from the Central Repository.


### II. Prevalence of Domestic Violence, Intimate Partner Violence and Stalking

Of all persons 18 and older in New Mexico, 24% (336,815) have been a victim of *domestic violence* in their lifetime, 18% (252,546) have been a victim of *intimate partner violence* in their lifetime, and 16% (229,603) have been a victim of *stalking* in their lifetime. It should be noted that more adults (26% or 369,221) have experienced *stalking* behaviors than any other interpersonal violence crime: females, 230,014; males, 139,207. However, the stalking definition from the National Violence Against Women Survey requires that stalking victims be "frightened" as a result of the stalking behavior. With this stipulation, almost

two-thirds (64%) of males and one-quarter (22%) of females who ever experienced stalking behaviors, are eliminated from consideration.

#### A. Domestic Violence Prevalence by Gender

- ▶ 15% (102,065) or 1 in 7 adult males in New Mexico has been the victim of domestic violence in his lifetime. See Figure 1.
- ► 32% (234,750) or 1 in 3 adult females in New Mexico has been the victim of domestic violence in her lifetime. Refer to Figure 1.



### B. Intimate Partner Violence Prevalence by Gender

- ▶ 10% (68,994) or 1 in 10 adult males in New Mexico has been the victim of intimate partner violence in his lifetime. Refer to Figure 1.
- ► 25% (183,552) or 1 in 4 adult females in New Mexico has been the victim of intimate partner violence in her lifetime. Refer to Figure 1.

### C. Stalking Prevalence by Gender

- ▶ 7% (49,819) or 1 in 14 adult males in New Mexico has been the victim of stalking in his lifetime. Refer to Figure 1.
- ► 25% (179,784) or 1 in 4 adult females in New Mexico has been the victim of stalking in her lifetime. Refer to Figure 1.

### III. Incidence Rates of Domestic Violence, Intimate Partner Violence and Stalking In The Last 12 Months (2005)

Rates for all interpersonal violence crimes in the last 12 months were slightly higher for females than males. There were 36,594 victims of domestic violence in New Mexico in the last year. Adult females comprise 54% of these victims (19,829) and the rate of *domestic violence* among adult women last year was 27 per 1000. There were 16,765 adult male victims of domestic violence last year, for a rate of 24 per 1000 adult males. Adult females comprise 56% (17,532) of victims of *intimate partner violence* for a rate of 24 per 1000 adult women, while adult male victims of intimate partner violence (13,816) were victimized at a rate of 20 per 1000 adult males. See **Table** 1.

At first review, it seemed there was greater disparity in victimization between the sexes with regard to *stalking*, than *domestic* and *intimate partner violence*. Of the 17,177 adult *stalking* victims last year, 83% (14,259) were adult women, for a rate of 20 per 1000 adult women, compared to 4 per 1000 for adult men. Refer to Table 1. These gender differences in large part, are due to the responses by gender to experiencing stalking behavior: 18,199 adult women reported experiencing stalking behavior in the last 12 months, and 78% (14,259) reported being frightened by the experiences, resulting in an attrition among female stalking victims of 22%. Conversely, 12,035 adult males reported experiencing stalking behavior in the last 12 months, and only 24% (2,918) reported being frightened by the experiences, resulting in an attrition of 76% among male stalking victims. Without the fear component, of all adult New Mexicans stalked last year, 60% would be females and 40% would be males. This difference between the sexes is only slightly greater than that reported for *intimate partner violence* victims (56% females, 44% males) and *domestic violence* victims (54% females and 46% males).

# IV. Characteristics of Interpersonal Violence Crimes As Reported by Those Who Were Ever A Victim

Examining differences in the characteristics of interpersonal violence crimes is not pure science as many of those who are victims of one type of interpersonal violence crime, are often victims of one or more additional types of interpersonal violence crimes (i.e. poly-victimization individuals). For instance, of 4000 survey respondents, 1,876 were *physically assaulted*. Of these physical assault victims, 1,026 were victims of *domestic assault*, (790 of which were assaulted by an *intimate partner*), 535 were *raped*, 582 were *stalked*, and 171 *molested*. When one attempts to examine differences in crime variables, individuals with multiple types of victimization can confound the findings. For instance, did a stalking victim who was also a victim of physical assault obtain a restraining order as a result of being *stalked* or as a result of being *physically assaulted*? An effort was made to isolate single-type victimization individuals from each interpersonal violence crime to allow for a clean comparison of crime characteristics across crime types. However, the


remaining samples for each type of crime were too small to obtain meaningful findings. For instance, of 701 stalking victims, only 76 (67 females, 9 males) were victims of stalking and no other interpersonal violence crimes. A sample of 9 males prohibits statistically significant findings of how many may have been injured, obtained and/or violated a restraining order, received medical care, pled guilty, etc. and may not be generalized to the statewide population of adult males with any confidence. Therefore, the following is a discussion of the findings that examine crime variables based on all victims of a crime, whether or not they are poly-victimization individuals.

## A. Demographics

### 1. Offenders


### a. Interpersonal Violence Offenders Are Mostly Males

While males comprise 30% of all adults who were ever victims of *domestic violence*, 27% of all adults who were ever victims of *intimate partner violence*, and 22% of all adults who were ever *stalking* victims, their offenders were frequently male, as well. Half (51%) of male *stalking* victims were victimized by a male. Almost two-thirds (62%) of male *domestic violence* victims were victimized by a male, and almost half (49%) of male *intimate partner violence* victims were victimized by a male. See **Figure 2**. Conversely, most interpersonal violence crimes with a female victim, were not victimized by a female. Only 13% of female *domestic violence* victims were victimized by a female. Only not serve victimized by a female and 7% of female *stalking* victims were victimized by a female. Refer to Figure 2.



#### b. Age of Offenders


Most offenders of interpersonal violence crimes are adults, *age 19 and older: domestic violence* (94)%, *intimate partner violence* (98%) and *stalking* (88%). However, significantly more perpetrators of *stalking* (9%) begin as teenagers (*ages 13-18*), than perpetrators of *domestic violence* (5%) and *intimate partner violence* (2%). See **Figure 3**.




### 2. Victims

### a. Age of Interpersonal Violence Victims


In general, most victims of interpersonal violence crimes are between the ages of *19 and 45*: *domestic violence* (66%), *intimate partner violence* (73%), and *stalking* (71%). The greatest proportion of *domestic violence* victims (27%) and *intimate partner violence* victims (32%) were *26-35* years of age; and the greatest proportion of *stalking* victims (28%) were *19-25* years of age. See **Figure 4**.




When examined by gender, there were significantly more female teen-age (13-17) *domestic viole*nce victims (6%) than male victims (3%), but significantly more older (*over age 55*) male domestic violence victims (12%) than female victims of the same age (7.5%). See **Figure 5**.



There were significantly more female *intimate partner violence* victims ages 7-18 (8%) than male victims of the same ages (2%). Conversely, there were significantly more male victims *over age* 45 (22.5%) than female victims of the same ages (14%). See **Figure 6**.




*Stalking* rates for males and females are similar when adolescents (ages 13-18) and increase dramatically for both genders at ages 19-25. However, significantly more females ages 19-25 (30%) and 26-35 (26%) are stalked than males of the same ages (22% and 21%, respectively). Conversely, significantly more males ages 46-55 are stalking victims (17%) than females of the same ages (9%). See **Figure 7**.



#### b. Ethnicity/Race of Interpersonal Violence Victims


Slightly over half of all adult interpersonal violence victims in New Mexico were *White(non-Hispanic): domestic violence* (54%), *intimate partner violence* (54%) and *stalking* (52%). At least one-third of all adult interpersonal violence victims were *Hispanic: domestic violence* (33%), *intimate partner violence* (34%) and *stalking* (35%). When examined by type of interpersonal violence crime, equal proportions of *Blacks* and "*Other*" ethnicities/races were victims of *domestic violence*, *intimate partner violence* and *stalking*, 1% respectively for each crime of both ethnic/race categories. See **Figure 8**.



#### B. Elements of Interpersonal Violence Crimes

#### 1. Interpersonal Violence and Alcohol/Drug Use

In over one-third (39%) of *stalking* victimizations, the victim was not sure if the stalker had been using drugs or alcohol at the time of the incident. Almost one-third (31%) of *stalking offenders* were using alcohol or drugs at the time of their offense; another 30% were *not* using drugs or alcohol at the time of their offense. Most stalking offenders (83%) are male, but the proportion of male and female stalking offenders using alcohol or drugs was virtually the same, 31% males and 30% females. See **Figure 9**.



Very few (4%) *stalking victims* reported using alcohol or drugs at the time they were being stalked. Most (78%) stalking victims are female. However, the proportion of male stalking victims that were using drugs or alcohol at the time of the stalking incident (8.5%) was almost three times that of the proportion of female victims who were using drugs or alcohol (3%). See **Figure 10**.


Almost two-thirds (62%) of *domestic violence offenders* were using alcohol/drugs at the time of the incident. Most domestic violence offenders (80%) were male. There was great disparity between the proportion of male offenders using alcohol/drugs (67%) and female offenders using alcohol/drugs (44%). Refer to Figure 9. In general, there were more male offenders who used alcohol/drugs at the time of the incident, than male offenders who did *not* (29%), and more female offenders who did *not* use alcohol/drugs (54%) at the time of the incident, than female offenders who did.

Less than one-quarter (21%) of *domestic violence victims* were using alcohol/drugs at the time of the incident. While most domestic violence victims were female (70%), a greater proportion of male victims (29%) used alcohol/drugs at the time of the incident, than female victims (18%). Refer to Figure 10.

Almost two-thirds (65%) of *intimate partner violence offenders* used alcohol/drugs at the time of the incident. Most offenders of intimate partner violence were male (80%); and most male offenders (70%) used

alcohol/drugs at the time of the incident, while most female offenders (52%) did *not* use alcohol/drugs at the time of the incident. Refer to Figure 9.

Over three-quarters of *intimate partner violence victims* (77%) did *not* use alcohol/drugs at the time of the incident. Significantly more male victims (33%) used alcohol/drugs than female victims (19%). Refer to Figure 10.



### 2. Interpersonal Violence and Weapon Use


In general, interpersonal violence crimes with *male* victims are more likely than those with *female* victims to involve a weapon. More *intimate partner violence* crimes with a male victim involved weapon use (41%), than *stalking* crimes with a male victim (39%) and *domestic violence* crimes with a male victim (36%). The rate of weapon use in interpersonal violence crimes with a female victim was almost constant across crimes: 30% *domestic violence*, 30% *intimate partner violence*, and 29% *stalking*. See Figure 11.


### 3. Interpersonal Violence and Victim Injury

Victims of *intimate partner violence* have a higher rate of injury (47%), than victims of *domestic violence* (44%) and *stalking* (44%). However, an examination by gender reveals that victims incurring the most injury are *female domestic violence* victims (49%), followed by *female intimate partner violence* victims (47%) and *female stalking* victims (44.5%). See **Figure 12**.


### 4. Interpersonal Violence and Serious, Disabling Injury

Adult victims of interpersonal violence are almost twice as likely (15%) to sustain serious, disabling injury than non-victims of interpersonal violence (8%). When examined by type of crime, *domestic violence* victims (16.5%), *intimate partner violence* victims (17%) and *stalking* victims (16%) experienced serious disabling injury at almost equal rates and twice the rate of the *non-victim* population. Slightly more male *domestic violence victims* (22%) sustained a serious disabling injury than male victims of *intimate partner violence*, (21%) and *stalking* (20%). Additionally, male victims of interpersonal violence crimes sustained






serious disabling injury at significantly higher rates than female victims of interpersonal violence crimes: *domestic violence* (14%); *intimate partner violence* (15%); and *stalking* (14%). See **Figure 13**.




### 5. Interpersonal Violence and Chronic Mental Health Problems

Adult victims of interpersonal violence are three times more likely to suffer from one or more chronic mental health conditions than individuals who have *not* experienced interpersonal violence. When examined by type of interpersonal violence crime, victims of *stalking* (12%), *domestic violence* (12%) and *intimate partner violence* (11%) were nearly four times more likely to suffer from one or more chronic mental health conditions than *non-victims* (3%). When examined by gender, female victims of each interpersonal violence crime were significantly more likely to suffer from a chronic mental health condition than their male counterparts. See **Figure 14**.



#### 6. Interpersonal Violence Crime Victims Receiving Medical Care

Just over one-third of injured *domestic violence* victims (35%), *intimate partner violence* victims (37%) and *stalking* victims (38%) obtained medical care for their injuries. There were slight differences between the proportion of injured males and females that obtained medical care, and slightly more (41%) male *stalking* victims obtained medical care than all other interpersonal violence victims. See **Figure 15**.





#### 7. Interpersonal Violence Crimes and Restraining Orders

More victims of *stalking* (26%) obtained a restraining order, than victims of *intimate partner* violence (23%) and domestic violence (21%). However, an examination by gender reveals that *female* victims of *domestic* and *intimate partner violence* crimes are 2.5 times more likely to obtain a restraining order than *male* victims. See **Figure 16**. Similarly, *female stalking* victims were almost two (1.75) times more likely to obtain a restraining order than all *male stalking* victims. Refer to Figure 16.

#### 8. Interpersonal Violence Crimes and Violation of Restraining Orders


Over half of all restraining orders issued to victims of interpersonal violence crimes were violated by the offender: *domestic violence* (53.5%), *intimate partner violence* (56%) and *stalking* (51%). Restraining orders obtained by male victims of intimate partner crimes were the ones with the highest rate of violation (58%). See **Figure 17**.






#### 9. Interpersonal Violence Crimes Reported to Police

More *intimate partner violence* crimes (41%) were reported to police than *domestic violence* (38%) and *stalking* (34%). Females reported more of each interpersonal violence crime to law enforcement, than males, with female *intimate partner violence* victims reporting the most frequently (44%). See **Figure 18**.




#### 10. Interpersonal Violence Crimes and Rate of Arrest

The rate of arrest for *stalking* crimes overall (5.5%) is significantly less than that of *domestic violence* and *intimate partner violence* crimes (17%, respectively). When examined by gender, the rate of suspect arrest is much greater in *domestic* and *intimate partner violence* crimes with a *female* victim (19%, respectively), than with a *male* victim (13% and 12%, respectively). Conversely, the rate of arrest for *stalking* crimes with a *female* victim (6%) is the similar for those with a *male* victim (5%, respectively). See **Figure 19**.



#### 11. Interpersonal Violence Crimes and Criminal Charges


In New Mexico, 1 out of 17 (6%) *stalking* victims and 1 out of 7 (14%) victims of *domestic* and *intimate partner violence* respectively, filed criminal charges against their offender. However, an examination by gender of the victim reveals that female victims of *domestic violence* (16%) and *intimate partner violence* (16%) were approximately two times more likely to file criminal charges than male victims, 9% and 7%, respectively. Conversely, male *stalking* victims (6%) were equally likely to file criminal charges as female stalking victims (6.5%), see **Figure 20**.



#### 12. Dispositions of Interpersonal Violence Criminal Charges


Offenders charged in *stalking* crimes obtained higher guilty or conviction rates (51%), than offenders in *intimate partner violence* crimes (39%) and *domestic violence* crimes (38%). Almost twice as many *intimate partner violence* (28%) and *domestic violence* (25%) charges were dropped as *stalking* charges (13%). An examination by victim gender reveals some interesting findings with regard to dispositions:

► Twice as many *intimate partner violence* crimes with a female victim (41%) obtained a guilty plea or conviction, as those with a male victim (20%); and a greater proportion of *intimate partner violence* crimes with a female victim obtained a guilty plea or conviction than males and females of *domestic violence* or *stalking* crimes. See **Figure 21**.




► Approximately 1 in 7 offenders in *domestic violence* crimes (14%) 1 in 8 (13%) offenders in *intimate partner violence* crimes, and 1 in 9 offenders in stalking crimes pled guilty.


▶ More offenders in all interpersonal violence crimes with a *female* victim pled guilty, than offenders in interpersonal violence crimes with a *male* victim, see **Figure 22**. Less than 1% of offenders with a male victim pled guilty, while 13.5% of offenders with a female victim pled guilty. Refer to Figure 22.



▶ The rate of acquittal for offenders of *intimate partner* and *domestic violence* crimes was 5%, respectively, and 4% for offenders of *stalking* crimes. The rate of acquittal for *intimate partner* crimes with a *male* victim was almost five times (14%) that of acquittal for *intimate partner* crimes with a *female* victim (3%). Similarly, the rate of acquittal for *domestic violence* crimes with a *male* victim was almost four times (11%) that of acquittal for *domestic violence* crimes with a *female* victim (3%). Conversely, the rate of acquittal for offenders of *stalking* crimes with a *female* victim (3%). Conversely, the rate of acquittal for offenders of *stalking* crimes with a *female* victim was greater (5%) than the rate for offenders of *stalking* crimes with a *male* victim (<1%). See Figure 23.




► The proportion of *domestic violence* crimes with the charges dropped was equal for those with a female victim and those with a male victim (25%, respectively). Conversely, dropped charges for *intimate partner* crimes with a *male* victim (36%) and *stalking* crimes with a *male* victim (33%), were greater than dropped charges for both crimes with *female* victims (26% and 11%, respectively). See **Figure 24**.



#### 13. Offender Sentencing In Interpersonal Violence Crimes

Over two-thirds (70%) of offenders convicted of *domestic violence* crimes and *intimate partner violence* crimes (69%) were sentenced to jail or prison. Slightly less (61%) offenders convicted of *stalking* crimes were sentenced to jail or prison. More offenders in *domestic violence* and *intimate partner violence* crimes with *female* victims (73% and 70%, respectively) than offenders in these crimes with *male* victims (60% and 68%, respectively), were sentenced to jail or prison. Conversely, significantly more offenders of *stalking* crimes with a *male* victim (100%) were sentenced to jail or prison than offenders of *stalking* crimes with a *female* victim (55%). However, this proportion of sentenced offenders with a male victim was based on a sample size of three victims, so this result is greatly inflated. See **Figure 25**.



#### 14. Average Jail or Prison Sentence for Interpersonal Violence Crimes


The average sentence length for *stalking* crimes is significantly shorter (1.97 years) than the average sentence length of *domestic violence* (3.04 years) and *intimate partner violence* (2.70 years). Offenders sentenced for *stalking* crimes perpetrated on *female* victims received an average sentence of 1.97 years while stalking offenders sentenced for crimes perpetrated on *males* received an average sentence of 2.0 years. Conversely, offenders sentenced for *domestic violence* crimes with a *female* victim received a slightly longer average sentence (3.06 years) than *domestic violence* offenders whose crime had a *male* victim (2.99 years). Offenders of *intimate partner violence* crimes perpetrated on a *female*, received a significantly longer average sentence (2.75 years) than those perpetrated on a *male* (1.50 years). See **Table 2**.

### 15. Rate of Sexual Assault Among Domestic Violence, Intimate Partner Violence and Stalking Victims

Almost half (48%) of New Mexico adults who were ever *stalking* victims in their lifetime were also sexually assaulted. This is higher than the proportion of those sexually assaulted who were ever victims of *domestic violence* (45%) and *intimate partner* violence (44%). See **Figure 26**.




*Females* who were ever victims of *domestic violence* were two times more likely to be sexually assaulted (55%), than their *male* counterparts (27%). In the last year, 12.5% of *domestic violence* victims were sexually assaulted. Again, *female* domestic violence victims were sexually assaulted at twice (16%) the rate of *male* domestic violence victims (8%). Refer to Figure 26.

Similarly, *females* who were ever victims of *intimate partner violence* were almost three times (2.8) more likely to be sexually assaulted (54%) than *male intimate partner violence* victims (19%). In the last year, 11.5% of *intimate partner violence* victims were sexually assaulted. Again, more *female intimate partner violence* victims were raped (13%) than *male* victims (9.5%). Refer to Figure 26.


*Females* who were ever victims of *stalking*, were two times more likely to be sexually assaulted (54%) than *male stalking* victims (27%). In the last year, 8% of *stalking* victims were sexually assaulted: 9% female victims and 2.5% male victims. Refer to Figure 26.

#### 16. Victim/Offender Relationship


Almost one-third (30%) of *domestic violence* incidents were perpetrated by a *relative* of the victim. One-quarter (26%) of domestic violence incidents were perpetrated by an *ex-spouse* and together with *current spouses* (9%), comprise 35% of all domestic violence offenders. Almost one-third (31.5%) of domestic violence incidents were perpetrated by a *current or past romantic interest: live-in partner* (2.5%); *boyfriend/girlfriend* (11%); *ex-boyfriend/ex-girlfriend* (18%). See **Figure 27**.



In cases of *intimate partner violence*, half (51%) were perpetrated by either an *ex-spouse* (38%) or *current spouse* (13%). Similarly, 45% were perpetrated by either an *ex-boyfriend/girlfriend* (28%) or *current boyfriend/girlfriend* (17%). Therefore, two-thirds (66%) of all intimate partner violence incidents were perpetrated by an *ex-romantic partner*. Only 4% of *intimate partner violence* incidents were perpetrated by a *live-in partner*. See **Figure 28**.



Most (33%) victims of *stalking* were stalked by *someone they knew* but were <u>not</u> a *relative* or ever a *romantic interest*. Stalking victims were as likely to be stalked by a *stranger* (28%), as by an *ex-romantic partner* (27.5%). *Current romantic interests, spouses* (2%), *boyfriends/girlfriends* (5%), and *live-in partners* (1%) comprised 8% of stalking perpetrators. Less than 3% of stalking victims were stalked by a *relative* (2%) or *someone else in their household* (<1%). See **Figure 29**.



# **SECTION TWO:** Analysis of 2005 Domestic Violence Data from the Central Repository

### I. DEFINITIONS

Domestic violence incidence as determined by law enforcement include all incidents of *assault*, *aggravated assault*, *battery*, and *aggravated battery* as outlined in the "Crimes Against Household Members Act" in statutes 30-3-10 through 3-3-16. Full definitions are found in **Appendix B**.

Data submitted from *law enforcement agencies* are used to determine statewide domestic violence *reported* incidence and the county rates of *reported* domestic violence.

Domestic violence cases as determined by *domestic violence service providers* include all *adult victims* who are accepted as clients by the providers for delivery of services. Data on children victimwitnesses and offenders served by domestic violence service providers are also analyzed and presented herein. None of the cases served by the domestic violence service providers are considered in the county reported rates of incidence to avoid possible duplication of reporting.

Domestic violence data from all *magistrate* and *district* courts include codes that capture *aggravated assault*, *aggravated battery*, *aggravated stalking*, *assault*, *battery*, *stalking* and *assault with intent to commit a violent felony*, all against a household member. These codes and the number of protection orders granted are extracted from the Administrative Office of the Courts Judicial Information System.

Currently, standardized data from each aforementioned discipline are submitted to the Central Repository on a quarterly basis. The data from the Central Repository analyzed for this report covers domestic violence data for the period 1/1/05 - 12/31/05.

### **II. FINDINGS**

#### A. How Many Domestic Violence Incidents in 2005 Were Identified by Law Enforcement

There were 101 law enforcement agencies that submitted domestic violence data to the Central Repository during 2005 (see **Appendix C**). Data from each participating agency was extracted from police offense incident reports and submitted in aggregate form on the standardized *Law Enforcement Domestic Violence Data Collection Form* (see **Appendix D**).

The total number of reports for each variable analyzed from law enforcement will vary as all questions may not be answered on each report submitted. The number of reports considered for each question analyzed is stated throughout the report as the findings on each variable are discussed.







Of 18,171 domestic violence victims, 40% (7,267) were *Hispanic*, 38% (6,965) *Caucasian*, 13.5% (2,460) *Native American*, and 3.5% (640) *Black*. Likewise, of the 15,607 reports that identified *suspect ethnicity*, 41% (6,361) were *Hispanic*, 37% (5,777) *Caucasian*, 13% (2,015) *Native American*, and 5% (839) *Black*. #### F. Who Went For Help As A Result Of Domestic Violence

There were 27 domestic violence service providers of a possible 35 direct service providers (providers) that submitted data to the Central Repository for 2005 (see **Appendix G**). The seven domestic violence service providers that did *not* submit data for 2005 include: *Morning Star* (Albuquerque), *Family Harmony Project* (Crownpoint), *Laguna Family Services* (Laguna), *Prevention Services/Domestic Violence Program* (Dulce), *Jemez Domestic Violence Program* (Jemez), *Santa Ana Domestic Violence Program, The Healing House* (Deming) and *El Puente* (Socorro).

Data from each participating agency was extracted from client intake information and submitted on the standardized *Domestic Violence Service Agencies Data Collection Form* (see **Appendix H**).

The total number of reports for each variable analyzed from service providers will vary as all questions may not be answered on each report submitted. The number of reports considered for each question analyzed is stated throughout the report as the findings on each variable are discussed.


#### 1. Number Seeking Services

There were 17,524 new clients served during 2005, which is a 15% decrease in the number of clients served in 2004.

An analysis was conducted comparing the number of adult victims served to the number of domestic violence incidents reported by law enforcement (in counties with the law enforcement agency from the largest city reporting, *and* where the direct service provider reported in all four quarters of 2005). This analysis revealed that *Santa Fe County* had the fewest number of victims receiving services relative to the

number of incidents reported to police (1 out of 8.6), followed closely by *McKinley County* (1 out of 8), *Chaves County* (1 out of 5.4) and *Bernalillo County* (1 out of 4.9). See Figure 33.



Adult victims who went for help in 2005 (8,371) represent 30% of domestic violence cases identified by law enforcement.

► Five Year Trends in The Percent of Law Enforcement Domestic Violence Incidents Represented by The Number of Adult Victims Served for Individual Counties



#### 2. Gender of Those Served


Survivor gender was documented in all 8,205 adult victims served. Ninety-four percent (7,747) of the *adult victims* served were *female*. Conversely, 90% (2,132) of the 2,381 reports that documented *offender* gender, reported the offender was *male*. Gender was documented in 6,255 of the 6692 *children victim-witnesses* served. There was an insignificant difference in the number of *female* children (49%) and *male* children (51%) who witnessed the abuse of an adult victim. See **Figure 34**.


#### 3. Ages of Those Served

The age of the *adult victim* was documented in 7,573 provider reports. Adult victims, 56% (4,230) were predominately 22-40 years of age, 23% (1,717) were 41-59 years of age, and 17% (1,282) were 18-21 years of age. Victims *age 60 and older* comprised 3% (204) of all adult victims served and those <18 years comprised 2% (140) of adult victims served. See **Figure 35**.



Of the 2,195 reports that documented *offender age*, 64% (1,404) were 22-40 years old, 19% (428) were 41-59, and 12% (264) were 18-21. Offenders *age 60 and older* comprised 3% (52) of all offenders served and those <18 comprised 2% (47) of all offenders. Refer to Figure 35.


The age of *children victim-witnesses* was documented in 6,031 of the 6,692 children served. Fortypercent (2,398) of the *children victim-witnesses* were between 0-5 years old, 34% (2,064) were 6-11 years old, 26% (1,550) were 12-17 years old, and <1% (14) were 18-21 years old. #### 4. Race/Ethnicity of Those Served

The *ethnicity of the adult victim* was identified in all 7,648 reports. Of these, 50% (3,791) were *Hispanic*, 33% (2,499) *Caucasian*, 13.5% (1,037) *Native American*, 2.5% (196) *Black*, 1% (79) *Other*, and

<1% (46) *Asian*. For a comparison of *adult victim ethnicity* distribution to the ethnic composition of New Mexico, see **Figure 37**.





*Hispanics* comprised 52% (2,997) of the 5,814 *children victim-witnesses* where *ethnicity* was documented, followed by 28% (1,639) *Caucasians*, 15% (889) *Native Americans*, 3% (184) *Black*, 1% (49) *Asian*, and 1% (56) *Other*. Refer to Figure 37.

Of the 2,281 offender reports that documented *offender ethnicity*, the race/ethnic group with the greatest number of offenders represented were *Hispanic*, 1,190 (52%), followed by 651 (28.5%) *Caucasian*, 316 (14%) *Native American*, 75 (3%) *Black*, and 34 (1.5%) *Other ethnicity*. 





The type of injury sustained was documented in 5,607 cases. *Minor* injuries comprised 88% (4,915) of all injuries reported, *severe lacerations* 4% (245), *major* injuries 3% (161), *broken bones* and *internal injuries* 2% each (125 respectively) and 1% (67) of victims were rendered *unconscious*. 

The ages of the children were documented in 4,209 cases. Almost one-third (31%) of these children were under 5 years of age, 16% were 6-9 years of age, and 8% were ages 10 - 12. Therefore, over half (55%) of those children who witnessed domestic violence incidents were not yet adolescents. Adolescents


between the ages of 13 - 17 comprised 20% of the children at the domestic violence scenes, while young adults, 18-21, comprised 25% of those who witnessed domestic abuse. See Figure 42.



There were 9,196 law enforcement reported domestic violence incidents that documented both the number of *incidents* with children present <u>and</u> the number of *children* present. Of these incidents, 1,362 had children present and the total number children present was 2,811 or 2.1 children per incident. The analysis of these incidents allow for a more accurate determination of the average number of children present when children witness family violence incidents.

### M. What About Injury and Sexual Assault Among Adult Victims and Children Who Went For Help


Of 5,686 service provider reports, 1,926 (34%) of *adult victims* reported being *physically injured* from the domestic assault. Similarly, there were 6,776 provider reports that identified 880 (13%) victims who experienced *forced or coerced sexual activity* from the current offender. See **Figure 43**.




Over one-quarter, 26% (1,357) of a possible 5,228 *children victim-witnesses*, experienced *physical abuse* from the current offender of the adult victim. Similarly, there were 4,601 provider reports that identified 255 (5%) *children victim-witnesses* who experienced *sexual abuse* from the current offender of the adult victim. Refer to Figure 43.

#### N. Who Are The People Hurting Their Partners or Family Members

Of 16,390 suspects reported by law enforcement, their relationship to the victim was documented among 15,050. Of these, a total of 44% were *boyfriend/girlfriend* (40%) and *ex-boyfriend/girlfriend* (4%). The *victim/suspect relationship* in 21% was *spouse* (18%) and *ex-spouse* (3%). *Relatives* accounted for 26% of identified *victim/suspect relationships*. See **Figure 44**.



The *victim/offender relationship* was documented in 86% (7,219) of service provider victim reports. Over one-quarter, 29% (2,122) of victims were *married* to their offender, and an additional 22% (1,584) were *living together*. Another 11.5% (828) were *dating* their offender and 28% were either an *ex-partner* (7% or 535), *separated* (15% or 1,056) or *divorced* (7% or 488). Therefore, 91% of those receiving direct services were the result of violence perpetrated by a former or current intimate partner. See **Figure 45**.




*Most domestic violence-related homicides (54% or 15 of 28) occurred in Bernalillo County.* These 15 domestic-related homicides represent 20% of the 75 homicides in Bernalillo County in 2005. Of 7 homicides in *Rio Arriba County*, 3 were domestic violence-related. Additionally, both homicides in *Soccorro County* in 2005 were domestic violence-related.

Comparison of Homicides and Domestic Violence-Related Homicides by County Table 21


Most victims of domestic violence homicides (5) were 36-45 years of age, followed equally by those victims ages 46-55 and *birth* -6, with 4 victims, respectively. When examined by gender of the homicide victims, most males were between the ages of 36-55, while the ages of most females were more evenly disbursed: 7 victims were *birth* – 35 years of age, and 5 victims were ages 36 and older. See Figure 46.



Most domestic violence-related homicides involved a *firearm*, 13 (46%). *Knives* and "*personal*" weapons (feet, fists, knee, etc.) were the weapons of choice in 5% of domestic violence-related homicides, respectively. In another 5% of domestic violence-related homicides, the cause of death was not specified. See **Figure 47**.




*Fathers* (5) and *husbands* (5) committed the most domestic violence homicides, followed by *boyfriends* (3). In all, *current romantic partners* were responsible for 11 of the 28 homicides. See **Figure 48**. Of the three suicides associated with intimate partner violence, all were *husbands* of the victims who shot their wives before killing themselves.



#### P. How Long Have Domestic Violence Victims Been In A Relationship With Their Offenders


There were 6,634 reports that documented the *length of relationship* between the victim and offender. The greatest number of victims (1,674 or 25%) reported a relationship with a duration of *3-5* years, followed by those who reported a relationship of *1-2* years (1,397 or 21%) and *6-10* years, (1,289 or 19%). Twenty-three percent (1,514) were together *11 years or longer* and 11% (760) were together less than a year. See **Figure 49**.



#### Q. How Many Victims and Offenders Have Been Victims Of Abuse When They Were Children

*Past victim abuse and/or the witnessing of abuse as a child* was documented in 5,300 provider reports. Over half (55% or 2,923) of *adult victims* reported experiencing *abuse as a child*. See **Figure 50**. Additionally, 62% or 3,531 of 5,680 of adult victims reported experiencing at least one prior domestic violence incident as an adult.

In 2005, there were 1,516 offender reports that documented past abuse. Of these, 39% (594) reported experiencing abuse as a child. However, when *victims* were asked if their *offender* was abused as a child, 67% (2,543 of 3,782) reported that their offender experienced abuse as a child. Refer to Figure 50.




#### R. Who Refers Adult Victims for Help and What Kind of Services Do They Receive

Adult Victims were mostly *self-referred* (26%) and referred by *law enforcement* (23%) to service providers for assistance.


#### S. Who Refers Children for Help and What Kind of Services Do Children Receive

Children were mostly referred by a *family member/relative* (47%). Those referred by *adult court* were a distant second (11%).


#### T. Who Refers Offenders for Help and What Kind of Services Do Offenders Receive

Offenders were mostly referred by *adult court* (81%). Another 6% of offenders were referred from *CYFD Child Protective Services* (4%) and *Juvenile Court* (2%). In contrast to adult victims, only 8% of offenders were *self-referred* for treatment.

### U. How Many Adult Victims Who Went for Help Reported Their Domestic Violence Incident to Police

In counties with the most complete reporting (those with the law enforcement agency from the largest city in the county reporting and with a minimum of 20 cases) a comparison was made between the number of protection orders filed in each county and the number of domestic violence cases reported to law enforcement in each county. *Curry County* had the highest number of protection orders filed in District Court relative to the number of domestic violence incidents reported by law enforcement in Curry County (103%), followed by *Valencia County* (92%) and *Chaves County* (71%). *Union County* had the fewest number of protection orders filed in District Court (3%) relative to the number of domestic violence incidents reported by law enforcement. 

#### Y. How Many Domestic Violence Charges Were Filed in District and Magistrate Courts in 2005

In law enforcement there is an undetermined number of domestic violence cases documented and processed as other crimes, such as fire, destruction of property, vandalism, homicide, false imprisonment, car collisions, etc., that are not known to be domestic violence-related, or when known, are not always entered into each law enforcement agency's database coded as domestic-related. Therefore, the family violence nature of the crime is not captured. This same problem in capturing some domestic violence incidents is true in the courts, as well.

With aggregate data, the best approach to capture as much reliable domestic violence incidents as possible, is to establish a consistent definition of domestic violence when extracting such data from law enforcement and court information systems. To this end, domestic violence cases examined from the courts include the following law enforcement charges, all perpetrated against a household member: *assault* (A), *aggravated assault* (AA), *battery* (B), *aggravated battery* (AB), *stalking* (S), *aggravated stalking* (AS), and *assault with intent to commit violent felony* (AIF). Data from all 32 district courts (**Appendix I**) and 48 magistrate courts (**Appendix J**) were extracted from the statewide Administrative Office of the Courts automated system. Data from the *Bernalillo County Metropolitan Court* (BCMC) case management database system was not provided to the Central Repository for this report.




1. District Court

Three-quarters (75%) of district court domestic violence cases included charges of *battery* (49%) or *aggravated battery* (26%). *Aggravated assault* and *assault* comprised 14% and 7% of domestic violence cases, respectively. *Aggravated stalking* comprised 2% of domestic violence cases, while *stalking* and *assault with intent to commit violent felony* comprised <1% and 1%, respectively. See **Figure 55**.



2. Magistrate Court


Of 7,993 disposed cases of domestic violence in magistrate courts, 80% were *battery* (67%) and *aggravated battery* (13%) charges. *Assault* and *aggravated assault* comprised 12% and 5% of cases, respectively. *Stalking, aggravated stalking,* and *assault with intent to commit violent felony* comprised 1%, respectively, of domestic violence cases disposed by the magistrate courts, (see **Figure 56**). These small proportions of domestic violence crimes with aggravating circumstances in magistrate courts are a reflection of the purview of the magistrate courts. Normally, crimes with aggravating circumstances, such as *aggravated battery, aggravated stalking, aggravated assault* and *assault with intent to commit a violent felony* are processed as felonies in the district courts.



## **SECTION THREE: Implications and Limitations of the Data**

## I. IMPLICATIONS OF THE FINDINGS

## A. Underreporting of Interpersonal Violence and Law Enforcement Procedural Training

 $\triangleright$ In 2005, law enforcement identified 18,778 victims from 28,256 reported incidents of domestic violence. The SSV identified almost twice as many victims (36,594) and each experienced an average of 5.5 incidents last year. Similarly, in 2005 law enforcement identified 206 stalking incidents. The SSV identified 17,177 victims and each experienced an average of 14.3 incidents last year. There are numerous administrative and procedural issues that affect accurate reporting of domestic violence and stalking incidents ranging from whether and how police offense incident reports are written, how these reports are entered into law enforcement databases or otherwise counted, what aggregate information is submitted to the Central Repository and how information is entered into the Central Repository. The issues surrounding identification of stalking incidents and victims are particularly worrisome. The SSV demonstrated that while one-third of stalking victims reported their experience to law enforcement, there were significantly fewer arrests for stalking (5.5%) than for domestic and intimate partner violence (17% respectively). It is imperative to provide necessary training to all law enforcement officers, administrative personnel, and executive personnel whose policies guide law enforcement procedure regarding the description, documentation and data entry of interpersonal violence crimes.

## B. Underreporting of Interpersonal Violence: Law Enforcement Interpersonal Violence Training, Victim Education and Advocacy, and Healthcare Surveillance

- Incidents of domestic violence go unreported to law enforcement due to refusal of family, friends, or neighbors to report. Furthermore, as many as 49% (3,697) of the adult victims who sought services from domestic violence service providers claimed they did not report their incident to law enforcement. This is similar to the 50% of adult victims who report their crime to law enforcement nationally. Nationally, most victims (15.4%) who do not report said they considered the victimization a *private or personal matter*. However, only slightly fewer victims (13.2%) did not report because they were *afraid of retaliation* by the offender, *believed that the police would do nothing* (7.3%), or *did not consider the incident was important enough* to report it to police (4.4%). These findings have implications for the need of prevention and treatment strategies that include law enforcement training on the dynamics of domestic violence, and victim training on adopting a safety plan and legal advocacy.
- Patients that are seen in the healthcare/emergency room setting with a domestic violence- and stalking-related injury are typically not reported to law enforcement and represent an additional area of underreporting. While many healthcare facilities use screening tools to identify patients who are victims of domestic violence, no standardized monitoring system to reliably document the number of these individuals currently exists. Methods to determine healthcare utilization by victims of interpersonal violence through e-codes or billing databases have been unsuccessful and are unreliable at best, due to definitional problems of the codes, practitioner discretion and inconsistencies in naming injuries, and the insurance related intentions of billing databases. The need to rectify these problems is underscored by findings from the SSV which revealed substantial co-

morbidity with interpersonal violence victims with regard to serous disabling injury and chronic mental health problems. Additionally, one-third to one-half of interpersonal violence victims were injured and over one-third of them sought medical treatment. Increased accuracy in reporting interpersonal violence incidents and identifying victims for referral to needed interventions requires interpersonal violence surveillance initiatives in New Mexico healthcare facilities.

## C. Interpersonal Violence Prevention Aimed At Adolescents

Of the 15,050 law enforcement incidents documenting the victim/offender relationship, 66% were perpetrated by a current or former intimate partner, 45% of these by current or former boyfriends/girlfriends who are or were dating or living together. Ninety-one percent of adult victims who sought services from a domestic violence service provider were assaulted by a current or former intimate partner, 33.5% of these were dating or living together. The SSV found that two-thirds (66.5%) of domestic violence incidents were perpetrated by current or former intimate partners, one-third of these were dating or living together. Similarly, stalking behaviors begin in adolescents and the incidence of adolescent stalking is almost twice that of adolescent intimate partner violence. The high proportion of interpersonal violence cases perpetrated by those not yet married, demonstrate that true prevention requires early education initiatives on building healthy relationships during adolescence.

# D. Alcohol and Drug Education and Treatment in the Prevention of Domestic Violence

Alcohol and/or other drug use was documented in 29% of law enforcement incidents, 93% of these involved *suspect* use of alcohol/drugs, 18% involved *victim* use of alcohol/drugs. Additionally, 27% of adult victims served by domestic violence service providers reported being under the influence of alcohol/drugs at the time of their incident. Findings from the SSV revealed that alcohol/drug use is significantly more likely among male victims and offenders than female victims and offenders. Implications for treatment for both victims and offenders include alcohol and drug prevention education and rehabilitation services with particular focus on males.

## E. Stopping The Cycle of Domestic Violence: Helping Children from Violent Families

On average in New Mexico, 1 in every 5 incidents of domestic violence reported by law enforcement involved a child witness and an average of two children were present at each. Of greater frequency, at least one child was present in 1 out of every 1.6 adult victim cases handled by domestic violence service providers. Too many children experienced physical abuse (26%) and sexual abuse (5%) at the hands of their adult-victim's offender. To be sure, the rates of physical and sexual abuse among these children and their national counterparts is grossly underreported. Even so, the information regarding children victim-witnesses is particularly disturbing since research demonstrates that a significant number of children who witness their mothers being abused by their fathers suffer from anxiety and depression and act out with their parents and siblings. Additionally, children who witness abuse suffer poor health, low self-esteem, poor impulse control, sleeping difficulties, and feelings of powerlessness. Furthermore, they are at high risk for alcohol and drug use, sexual acting out, running away from home, isolation, loneliness, fear, and suicide.

- Perhaps the percent of *adult victims* (55%) and *offenders* (67%) in New Mexico who were *abused as children* is a testament to the validity of such research regarding the negative consequences of experiencing abuse in the home as a child. Since 74% of the children present at the scene of the incident (as reported by domestic violence service providers) were under the age of 13, there is a
- need for early identification, education, and therapeutic interventions for children living in violent families.

### F. Interpersonal Violence Advocacy and Prevention

Findings from the SSV demonstrated that 1 in 7 adult males in New Mexico has been the victim of domestic violence in his lifetime, 1 in 10 a victim of intimate partner violence and 1 in 14 a victim of stalking. More outreach must be done to identify male victims of interpersonal violence to offer prevention and treatment programs specific to males.

## G. Providing Offender Treatment Programs

- In New Mexico, 77% of suspects identified by law enforcement and 90% of offenders identified by domestic violence service providers are *male*. Findings from the SSV revealed that 83% of stalking offenders and 80% of domestic violence and intimate partner violence offenders are male. Even when males are the victims in interpersonal violence crimes, half to two-thirds are being victimized by a male. Perhaps greater outcomes in domestic violence prevention may be realized through greater availability of offender prevention and therapeutic programs that include strategies for addressing aggression in male socialization.
- Findings from the SSV reveal that almost half of the adults in New Mexico who were ever a victim of domestic violence, intimate partner violence or stalking were also sexually assaulted. This suggests that effective prevention and treatment programs for interpersonal violence must include components of sexual assault prevention and treatment or must provide referrals to appropriate sexual assault services.

## H. Interpersonal Violence and Needed Changes in Law Enforcement, Prosecution and The Courts To Reduce The Risk of Harm for Male and Female Victims

Findings from the SSV demonstrate that female victims are more likely than male victims to report their offense, two times more likely to file criminal charges against their offenders and are more likely to get a restraining order against their offenders, even though interpersonal crimes with male victims involve more alcohol/drugs, weapon use and more serious disabling injury. Additionally, while half of all restraining orders are violated, male victims of intimate partner violence crimes are more likely to have a restraining order violated, less likely to have their offenders arrested, significantly more likely that the charges against their offenders will be dropped or the offenders will obtain an acquittal. Further, if their offenders are convicted, offenders of male victims are more likely to serve less time in jail or prison than offenders of female victims. While all of the system failures that contribute to the high risk of harm for female victims of interpersonal violence were widely known, it is clear from these findings that interpersonal violence is dangerous for males, as well. While both genders do not utilize system protections as they should, male victims are even less likely than female victims to do so; and even when system protections are sought for intimate partner violence, violations of restraining orders are more frequent and convictions of their offenders less

frequent for male victims. All of this speaks to: 1) the need for early education to correct misconceptions in gender socialization; 2) greater community education to increase awareness of the incidence and risk of interpersonal violence among males; 3) comprehensive training of law enforcement, prosecutors and judges regarding the high risk of harm for men and women victims of interpersonal violence and the development of protocol in their respective disciplines aimed at reducing the likelihood of harm, disability and death of all interpersonal violence victims.

## **II. LIMITATIONS OF THE DATA AND FUTURE DATA NEEDS**

While it is extremely important to have a statewide estimate of domestic violence based on standardized data collected from several disciplines or service domains (law enforcement, domestic violence service providers, and district and magistrate courts), there are several areas of data collection that need to be upgraded and/or expanded to improve the quality of the data. The goal is to obtain a clearer picture of domestic violence in our state with regard to its burden on families, the criminal justice, judicial, and healthcare systems and the economic toll on individuals, professional helping agencies and the State of New Mexico.

### A. Law Enforcement

- Improve the accuracy of domestic violence victim and suspect identification. Data submitted to the Central Repository by law enforcement agencies are in aggregate form and derived from officer-submitted offense incident reports. The way an individual officer completes the offense incident form directly impacts what is counted as a domestic violence incident and the identification of suspects and victims. For instance, victims in the Albuquerque Police Department database are identified by a "V" code on the offense incident report. However, an officer responding to a domestic violence incident may fill in a "PR" code as "person reporting" or "I" code for "person interviewed" rather than a "V" code and these victims would not be counted. The same is true for suspect designations. This in part, explains why 28,256 reported domestic violence incidents only had 18,778 victims and 16,390 suspects identified. Additionally, some law enforcement agencies simply do not complete the victim and suspect information requested on the standardized law enforcement data collection form. Better identification of victims and suspects involved in domestic violence cases is warranted, as well as better identification and reporting of stalking incidents.
- The Albuquerque Police Department and the Bernalillo County Sheriff's Office do not differentiate crimes committed by *boyfriends* and *girlfriends* but instead categorize them together. This makes it impossible to differentiate the incidence of *boyfriend* offenders from the incidence of *girlfriend* offenders. Since true prevention of domestic violence requires changes in offender behavior, the actual number of offenders by gender is needed to justify gender-specific curriculum development in prevention programs.
- Injuries as currently defined by terms on the offense incident reports are not mutually exclusive. For instance, some *internal injuries* and *severe lacerations* may also be *major injuries*. A more sensitive value for representing the type of injuries incurred is needed to more accurately define and count the kinds of injuries actually being incurred by victims, suspects and police. Further, more effort should be made to accurately capture injuries to law enforcement personnel responding to domestic violence incidents.

## **B.** District Attorney's Offices

- Greater study must be focused on what the district attorney's offices need to process domestic violence cases in a timely and accurate manner, and then appropriate steps taken to address these identified roadblocks. In practice, those district attorney's offices that have a specialized prosecution unit, i.e. one or more prosecutors assigned exclusively to domestic violence cases (depending on the size of the court's jurisdiction) have less cases dismissed for lack of preparation and therefore, more cases prosecuted. For this reason, all statewide district attorney's offices should be encouraged to establish a specialized prosecution unit.
- Greater advances in vertical prosecution which prosecute crimes based on evidence and does not require the victim to press charges or testify, would greatly reduce the high number of dismissals for this reason. Requiring victims who fear retribution from the offender or economic ruin for themselves and their children to testify as a requirement of prosecution, merely encourages the cycle of abuse. In the end, only 32% of disposed magistrate court cases of domestic violence ended with an offender conviction. Furthermore, the percent of cases that did not make it to disposition is not exactly clear from currently provided data. This is not encouraging news for victims whose purpose for involving the court is to obtain protection from the offender. Indeed, it is the frequency of such experiences which discourages survivors from reporting subsequent assaults perpetrated on themselves and their children.
- Data needs from the Administrative Office of the District Attorney's (AODA) include case disposition information such as the number of convictions at trial, the number of pled cases and pled to lesser charges, the number of trial acquittals, and sentencing information on both misdemeanor and felony domestic violence charges. Currently, no reliable data from the AODA has been made available to the Central Repository.

## C. The Courts

- While the Administrative Office of the Courts provides domestic violence information to the Central Repository for all district and magistrate courts throughout the state, the Bernalillo Count Metropolitan Court (BCMC) does not participate. This is quite disturbing, since it is the largest jurisdiction in the state and handles the most misdemeanor cases. A better effort should be made on the part of BCMC to address whatever obstacles exist that prevent them from reporting on their court's activity regarding domestic violence crimes in Bernalillo County.
- In the last four years, law enforcement officers have been trained in the investigation of domestic violence cases to promote prosecution based on case evidence versus victim testimony, as is done in homicide, suicide and other crimes. However, many magistrate judges throughout the state still dismiss evidence-based prosecution cases if the victim does not appear, as well. The recommendation is for all magistrate judges to be trained on the merits of evidence-based prosecution so that cases without victim testimony will still be accepted for prosecution.
- The ideal way to collect domestic violence data from the AOC would be by individual or unique cases versus the aggregate data presently collected. This would allow for better tracking of cases from the time they are open to the time they are dismissed and provide for more accurate information regarding conviction rates, repeat offenders, penalties given and length of sentences. While it would be costly and improbable to attempt this type of data collection on a statewide level, carefully selecting a few counties to study unique domestic violence data would provide information which could help answer critical questions about this issue that present data cannot address.

- Currently, case information is obtained on domestic violence cases processed by the district and magistrate courts. However, reliable sentencing information must be provided from all courts. Standardized and consistent data entry of sentencing information by administrative personnel at each magistrate and district court would provide for a comparative analysis of the sentencing of misdemeanor and felony domestic violence convictions.
- The current information obtained from statewide district and magistrate courts does little to inform the most important policy and resource decisions regarding the prosecution and adjudication of domestic violence crimes. There are too many important questions that can not be addressed with currently provided data. How many cases are pled to a lesser charge? How many domestic violence cases are dismissed and what are the reasons for dismissal? What kind of sentence is one most likely to receive who is convicted of a misdemeanor domestic violence crime and does this differ significantly from what one is most likely to receive who is convicted for a felony? If the sentence given is jail or prison, what is the average length of time served by the offender before being released? What is the average length of time after an offender is released before re-offending? How many offenders are given intervention programs as part of their disposition and what is the rate of compliance? Providing data that is capable of offering answers to these questions would provide greater clarity with regard to the implications for improving prosecution and more effectively adjudicating domestic violence cases.

### D. Domestic Violence Service Providers

- There are six agencies that provide services to domestic violence victims that are not active in our statewide surveillance: Family Harmony Project (Crownpoint), Laguna Family Services (Laguna), Prevention Services/Domestic Violence Program (Dulce), Jemez Domestic Violence Program (Jemez) and Santa Ana Domestic Violence Program. These programs serve the needs of American Indians. Unfortunately, no organization that represents American Indians has been successful in capturing their victimization experience and sharing the information with statewide professional helping organizations, state government and the legislature. This lack of information makes it extremely difficult to consider the needs of American Indian victims and formulate an appropriate response to address them. Therefore, American Indian organizations are encouraged to establish a standardized system of data capture and information sharing to improve statewide and community response to violence in their families.
- To obtain more accurate client information from service providers with regard to the types of services clients receive and streamline the data collection and reporting process for service providers, the Director of the Central Repository should collaborate with representatives from the service providers, CYFD and other major funding agencies, (such as Victims of Crime Act (VOCA) and Violence Against Women Act (VAWA) administrators), to address needed data collection variables and data sharing procedures.

## E. Medical Facilities

The process for collecting standardized domestic violence data from statewide medical facilities is not yet completed. Since many times the first, and perhaps only contact a victim may have with the "helping system" is through a hospital emergency department or physicians' office, this creates a significant void in the Central Repository data and represents a major obstacle in accurately defining the scope and nature of domestic violence in our state. Moreover, until better protocols are established for identifying patient visits associated with interpersonal violence, a significant portion

of the total cost of interpersonal violence to individuals, their communities and the state cannot be estimated.

## F. Closing Comments

The aforementioned improvements in data collection will ultimately be required to answer the type of domestic violence questions that are most critical in guiding public policy decisions, program development and the most effective allocation of resources. To this end, the Central Repository Director will continue to pursue collaborations with statewide agencies (both current participants and non-participants) and the State Department of Health and the Department of Public Safety to develop a process for enhancing our present data collection system.

### **APPENDIX B. DEFINITIONS**

Domestic violence incidence as determined by law enforcement include all incidents of assault, aggravated assault, battery, and aggravated battery as outlined in the "Crimes Against Household Members Act" as follows:

#### 30-3-10. Short Title.

This act (30-3-10 to 30-3-16 NMSA 1978) may be cited as the "Crimes Against Household Members Act".

#### **30-3-11.** Definitions

As used in the Crimes Against Household Members Act (30-3-10 to 30-3-16 NMSA 1978), "household member" means spouse, former spouse or family member, including a relative, parent, present or former step-parent, present or former in-law, a co-parent of a child or a person with whom a person has had a continuing personal relationship. Cohabitation is not necessary to be deemed a household member for the purposes of the Crimes Against Household Members Act.

#### 30-3-12. Assault against a household member.

- A. Assault against a household member consists of:
  - (1) an attempt to commit a battery against a household member; or
  - (2) any unlawful act, threat or menacing conduct that causes a household member to reasonably believe that he is in danger of receiving an immediate battery.
- B. Whoever commits assault against a household member is guilty of a petty misdemeanor.

#### 30-3-13. Aggravated assault against a household member.

- A. Aggravated assault against a household member consists of:
  - (1) unlawfully assaulting or striking at a household member with a deadly weapon; or
  - (2) willfully and intentionally assaulting a household member with intent to commit any felony.
- B. Whoever commits aggravated assault against a household member is guilty of a fourth degree felony.

# **30-3-14.** Assault against a household member with intent to commit a violent felony.

- A. Assault against a household member with intent to commit a violent felony consists of any person assaulting a household member with intent to kill or commit any murder, mayhem, criminal sexual penetration in the first, second or third degree, robbery, kidnapping, false imprisonment or burglary.
- B. Whoever commits assault against a household member with intent to commit a violent felony is guilty of a third degree felony.

#### 30-3-15. Battery against a household member.

- A. Battery against a household member consists of the unlawful, intentional touching or application of force to the person of a household member, when done in a rude, insolent or angry manner.
- B. Whoever commits battery against a household member is guilty of a petty misdemeanor.

#### 30-3-16. Aggravated battery against a household member.

- A. Aggravated battery against a household member consists of the unlawful touching or application of force to the person of a household member with intent to injure that person or another.
- B. Whoever commits aggravated battery against a household member by inflicting an injury to that person that is not likely to cause death or great bodily harm, but that does cause painful temporary disfigurement or temporary loss or impairment of the functions of any member or organ of the body, is guilty of a misdemeanor.
- C. Whoever commits aggravated battery against a household member by inflicting great bodily harm or doing so with a deadly weapon or doing so in any manner whereby great bodily harm or death can be inflicted, is guilty of a third degree felony.
